Our (Not So) Secret Gardens

pril marks a month of floral activities in San Juan Bautista. Those with container gardens and landscapes needing re-plantings will be in luck, when they shop the San Juan Service Club Plant Sale on April 16-17. From 8am to 3pm, pots and flats of flowers, shrubs and ground coverings in eye-popping colors will all be available for purchase at amazingly low prices. Bring cash and look for directional signs to the sale as you enter our city from Highway 156.

Then, on April 23-24, our Community Center at 10 San Jose St. becomes a drought tolerant utopia during the Spring Monterey Bay Cactus and Succulent Society show and sale. From 9am to 4pm, experts will be on-site to answer questions and package up prickly, smooth or spiny purchases. It's a fantastic weekend of gorgeous and bizarre desert-

based offerings, many of which are in bloom, and it also includes a show of prize winning beauties grown by Society members. You may find yourself craving a margarita after all this cactus activity!

Plant life abounds in our special Central Coast climate, and the San Juan Valley, in particular, has been the ideal location for horticultural cultivation for centuries. Our temperate climate and rich, loamy soil sustains a billion-dollar produce industry, as well as numerous independent specialty crops and vineyards.

Evidence of these long-established plantings can be found at our secret gardens walking tour at San Juan Bautista State Historic Park. For a small entry fee, you can access the centuries-old orchard, which still produces pears, plums, loquats and lemons. It also supports numerous and gigantic prickly pear cacti, which bear

huge, spiny fruits. From there, continue vour tour through the Plaza Stables to the Zanetta Wash House area. This quiet, idyllic space boasts a huge array of California Heritage roses and plants, neatly labeled for identification. These vintage beauties have called this space home for more than 150 years!

Little benches afford you the opportunity to sit and enjoy the hum of the bees, and watch the birds and the butterflies at work.

As you exit this garden, cross the huge Plaza Lawn over to Old Mission San Juan Bautista, where you can tour the Mission rose gardens. This sanctuary of vines and grottos surrounds you with substantial, gnarly, tree-sized bushes of Mission Heritage roses, which boast colors of magnificent variety and genetic roots of 220 years. Little tucked away coves and meandering paths afford the garden tourist an opportunity to rest, relax, and enjoy the sheltering adobe walls of the Mission and its Chapel. History boards on-site also provide written information on the fruit and vegetable production once attributed to dozens of verdant acres owned and cultivated by the Mission from its late 1700s inception.

When you leave this garden, stroll across the street to the historic replica Settlers' Cabin, where you will negotiate gentle paths through clusters of plantings, showing off shrubs, flowers and trees indigenous to this area of California. It's also a lovely, shady spot in which to picnic.


All this foliage and sweet aromas may spark your appetite, and both Mexican restaurants on our Third Street corridor have outdoor dining, one with a cozy, shaded patio of intimate greenery, and the other with a more copious area of floral and succulent surroundings. The Fourth Street Basque restaurant also gives you outdoor garden elbow room for a temperate dining experience, and they ferry take-out meals to the lovely, light festooned garden patio of the Third Street located Wine and Beer bar. For the java and pizza crowd, our people's choice Coffee Roastery, also on Fourth Street, has recently expanded its own outdoor garden dining area.

If you don't want to plant flowers, bouquets are sold at the Saturday morning Farmer's Market on Duncan Road.



Skin Care Tips for Teenagers

eing a teenager is tough. With all that young adults go through, acne breakouts can make it that much tougher. Hormones often play a major role in adolescent acne, but that shouldn't stop teens from developing good habits to lessen symptoms.

Diet

The saying "you are what you eat" is true and false. It's not all about that Hershev bar, but our skin is the biggest organ of elimination—what goes in most certainly comes out. Greasy foods and sugar can

be a factor in acne, but most likely food allergies, like iodized salt (found in a lot of processed foods) and dairy, can be huge factors. These triggers should be the first thing to think about when trying to clear up skin. And always remember to drink lots of water!

Home care routine

All teens should cleanse their skin every day and ESPECIALLY at the end of the day. For athletes who don't have an opportunity to cleanse their skin immediately after games or practice,

at least rinse the skin with water. Something is better than nothing. Teens should also know that exfoliating and moisturizing is almost as important as cleansing. While cleansers get rid of grease and grime, exfoliating removes dead skin and oil buildup that can clog the pores; moisturizing keeps the skin's oil levels balanced.

Picking

Keep those hands off the skin! It's pretty common for most of us to pick at blemishes. It feels like instant gratification. But picking and squeezing will most likely create more blemishes, and in some cases dark spots or scarring. In no way will picking a blemish help it heal faster. If you see a blemish, ice the area for 10 minutes to decrease inflammation, or apply a clay mask.

Products

Not all products are created equal. Yesterday's Clearasil is today's Proactiv. These products claim they can clear teen skin of horrible breakouts, but that couldn't be further from the truth. Most teen product lines do nothing but dry the skin of its naturals oils. A good skincare line will create a balance. Skin should feel "normal" after cleansing and hydrating, not too dry or oily. And while some products that target teens may work at first, their effectiveness fades once the skin acclimates. Be wary of products with too much alcohol and benzoyl peroxide, which can dry out skin. Look for healing ingredients like zinc oxide, or hydrating lactic acids that exfoliate and soothe skin.

It's always best to consult an esthetician before starting any new skin regime, and teens should be encouraged to start with a professional facial—no matter how much they resist. They most certainly will thank you later.

isten up, local gardeners: You don't have to be afraid of growing drought tolerant plants anymore.

Waterwise gardening is no longer synonymous with cactus and gravel. Wendy Proud, sales representative for Mountain States Wholesale Nursery, was kind enough to talk with me after speaking at February's Western Horticultural Society meeting in Los Altos. During her talk, Wendy showed slide after slide of attractive, blooming plants that are well adapted to the new California landscape. These plants will save you money! And once established, not only do they require very little water, most also grow fairly slowly so they need less maintenance. In addition, regionally appropriate plants tend to require less fertilizer and pest control. But these plants are not boring. Many of these waterwise plants either bloom continuously for months on end or have flower spikes

that last for several months each. Here are Wendy's top-five plants for our area.

Calliandra

'Sierra Starr' is a small shrub that will grow almost anywhere, and at a moderate pace. It is a hybrid between two California natives and has ferny looking leaves. It blooms on and off all year long with red puff-ball flowers beloved by hummingbirds. Calliandra does best in full sun and will even tolerate reflected heat.

Bulbine frutescens

'Tiny Tangerine' is a dwarf form of a succulent native to South Africa. It too will grow almost anywhere, even in a fair amount of shade. This small succulent is a great choice for those of us concerned

with fire-safe landscaping. The leaves look like green onions and are topped by slightly taller spikes of orange flowers with vellow stamens. Bulbine flowers will appear during cooler months.

Eremophila hygrophana

'Blue Bells' is a small shrub native to Australia with a Mediterranean look, small silvery leaves and larger, tubular purple-blue flowers. Its natural tendency to grow in a rounded-upright form means that you rarely have to prune to shape. It prefers a sunny, hot situation with good drainage. This is another waterwise plant that blooms all year, attracting bumblebees to your garden.

Hesperaloe

'Pink Parade' is a real show stopper in bloom. It is a stemless succulent, suitable for fire-safe landscaping, but that's almost beside the point. The unarmed (not sharp or spiny) leaves are about an inch wide and grow three- to four-feet long, arching up and out a bit. Most of the time they are bright green, but they'll also turn pink with cold and drought stress. The plant grows in gradually spreading clumps, with flower spikes arising from the clumps up to six feet tall. Hesperaloe looks great in either the ground or containers.

Vauquelinia californica

Our last plant is not as showy as the others, and despite the name it's not a California native. But it looks like it could fill an important niche in the waterwise landscape. The foliage and shape of this shrub is very similar to oleander but no part of Vauquelinia is poisonous. It grows slowly and would be useful as a natural or sheared hedge in either full sun or part shade.

In conclusion, don't think that growing drought tolerant plants is a death sentence to your beautiful landscape. More and more attractive, waterwise plants are becoming available. It's up to us to ask for them and give them a try.

Farmer in the Field

Edible, Beneficial ... Weeds?

omething caught my eye while researching seasonal produce that I had never seen or heard of before: lambsquarters.

It sounds like a hind quarter of a lamb but is actually a weed—an edible weed. I moved on with my research, looking for something interesting and delicious to write about, but couldn't stop thinking about this. Why would anyone eat weeds?

Dandelion greens are technically a weed and they are acceptable to eat. I have often thought we'd be rich if we could only make money off the mallow weeds that grow so proficiently on the farm. The greens provide 535 percent of the recommended daily value of vitamin K and 112 percent of the daily minimum requirement of antioxidant vitamin A. Benefits are broad ranging, from strengthening bones to

preventing Alzheimer's disease.

Lambsquarters—a.k.a. fat hen, goosefoot, pigweed and wild spinach—can be used fresh in salads, cooked in soups or sautéed. Wherever you would use kale or spinach, I think, lambsquarters could be substituted. The seeds can be ground into dark flour to make bread and the leaves can be dried and ground to make tortillas. The weed also has many nutritional properties: it can be used to combat swelling, rheumatism and arthritis, and it's good for toothaches!

And then there is the stinging nettle, which grows wild in our creek. Our grandson touched the plant one time and lost his fingernail within days. Chefs have requested this prickly weed and we have obliged, but no more—Dick has vowed to hang up his gloves for good and stay out of the nettle patch. I have had nettle soup, and as a garnish on an

appetizer, and it was delicious. You can make tea with the dried leaves and seasonings. Nettle also has a list of nutritional properties, but make sure you learn how to handle it before you jumping into the nettle pot.

Nettle Soup

Be sure to wear heavy gloves when removing the nettle leaves from the stems. If you can't find nettle leaves, you can substitute Swiss chard or spinach with delicious results.

SERVINGS: 8

INGREDIENTS

- 3 medium russet potatoes (about 1 3/4 pounds), peeled
- Coarse salt
- 9 tablespoons unsalted butter
- 6 tablespoons olive oil
- 3 medium red onions, finely chopped
- 8 cups packed nettle leaves
- 8 cups homemade or low-sodium store-bought chicken stock
- Heavy cream, for drizzling
- Freshly ground pepper

DIRECTIONS

- 1. Place potatoes in a medium pot, and cover with cold water; add 1 tbsp. salt. Bring to a boil, and cook until potatoes are tender, about 25 minutes. Drain; cool completely. Cut into 1/4-inch dice; set aside.
- 2. Melt butter with the oil in a large pot over medium heat. Add onions and nettle leaves; cook, stirring often, until onions are softened but not browned, about 5 minutes. Add stock, 3/4 cup water, and 1 tbsp. salt; stir to combine. Simmer, stirring occasionally, until nettle leaves soften, about 30 minutes. Let cool slightly.
- 3. Using an immersion blender or food processor, puree soup until smooth (use caution when pureeing hot liquids in a food processor). Reheat soup over low heat. Divide among serving bowls. Garnish with the potatoes, and drizzle with cream. Season with pepper, and serve.

Pet Life

A few things to know if you take your dog camping

any dog owners (and dogs!) enjoy spending the spring and summer months camping and exploring the great outdoors. But there are a few things should should take into consideration when planning your next trip.


Vaccinations: Make sure your dog is current on vaccinations. Rabies is especially important when camping due to increased wildlife exposure. Talk to vour veterinarian about other vaccines, such as Lyme, Leptospirosis and Rattlesnake, which your dog may need. These are not considered "core" vaccines, so your dog may not have had them. If these are new vaccines for your dog, it will take several weeks for him or her to receive the two vaccines and develop

adequate immunity. Remember, getting a vaccine on the way to the campground will not provide adequate protection!

Fleas & Ticks: Always apply a reputable flea and tick product. If you have ever looked at a wild animal up close and personal, you would be astounded at the number of fleas and ticks found on that cute squirrel or deer. Fleas and ticks can transmit some nasty

diseases to both you and your pet, and an untreated animal can bring home an infestation that can take up to a year to clear from your home. Don't take the chance.

Food & Water: Bring along a supply of your dog's normal food. Feeding him barbecue meat from the grill is likely to cause gastroenteritis (vomit and diarrhea) if you're lucky, or life-threatening pancreatitis in more severe

cases. Besides, who wants to sleep and travel with a furry companion smelling of vomit and diarrhea? Provide your pet with the same quality drinking water that you would drink. Drinking from creeks and other standing water is a good way to contract diseases such as giardia.

Leash & Collar: Be sure your dog is wearing a proper fitting collar with identification and a rabies tag. The contact information should be current and include a reachable cell phone. If your dog has a microchip, make sure the microchip tag is on the collar and easy to see. Even if you think your dog's training is infallible, bring a leash. Something new on the trail may entice or startle, and it's tragic to have a dog lost or even killed on an outdoors trip because they weren't kept on a leash. Aside from wandering off, you also don't

want your dog interacting with other public dogs on the campgrounds. You would be amazed at what some people think is an appropriate dog to bring to a public campground-aggressive, sick and often unvaccinated.

Know the Area: Do some research before leaving home. Find out what terrain you expect to encounter. What will the weather be like? Are there rattlesnakes in the region? Does the campground allow dogs? Where is the closest emergency veterinary clinic?

Camping is a great way to enjoy the outdoors with your pet, but good planning will help make the trip safe and even more enjoyable for both of you.


south San Jose campus, 260 International Circle.

The Lure of Fishing

Don't Let Fly Fishing Intimidate You

hen I get into conversations regarding fishing, the most frequent comment I get is, "I always wanted to learn to fly fish."For those who have never done it, fly fishing can be shrouded in mystery. Many people have seen movies like A River Runs Through It or The River Why and thought to themselves, "I'd like to try that someday."

As you know, "someday" often never comes, so in this month's column I am going to give you the basics so anyone, young or old, can get out with a fly rod and experience the thrill of solving the mystery of fly fishing!

If you have ever spent any time out on our local waterways, I would bet that it is extremely rare to have never seen a person fly fishing. That's not because fly fishing is unproductive. If you think

about it, if it is very rare to see fish as well. My point is fish see a lot of lures through the course of a year, but they do not see what a fly fisher throws.

The good news is you don't need to spend a lot of money or get a lot of gear for fly fishing our local waters. Another nice thing is you don't have to be an expert at casting a fly to have success! A basic fly rod setup, a handful of flies and the ability to lay a cast 20 to 30 feet out in front of you is all that's required for a fun and successful day at the lake.

In the information age, everything you need to get started is at your fingertips! Spend a little time researching on YouTube to get visual learning tips for fun fly fishing. Look up "Basic Fly Casting Techniques" or "Fly Fishing for Bass and Panfish." Just those two searches alone will keep you

busy for hours. I would bet that after watching some of the videos, you'll develop an itch to get a fly rod and some flies and give it a try!

If you are a skeptic by nature, maybe you're thinking, "I don't want to go to the trouble of learning and getting rigged up and then fail because fishing here is no good." Well, I have something to share with you: on a recent outing to a local lake with my daughter, I observed bass boats and bank anglers throwing "tackle and lures" all over the lake. I did not see one fish caught. My daughter and I were fly fishing and lure fishing as well. In the several hours we spent on the lake, the lures produced no results. Meanwhile, the fly fishing produced six bass and a crappie. All of the fish came from shallow water not more than 20 feet from the bank. We were doing something that no one else was doing: fly fishing and catching fish! That makes for a fun day.

What you need to fish our local waters is the following:

- · A basic 5- or 6-weight fly rod with a weight forward floating line. These can be purchased at our local specialty sports stores. You can get a nice combo of rod, reel and line for about \$79.00 and up.
- · A very basic selection of flies. Wooly Buggers in olive, brown and black; small clousers in white/chartruse; small poppers or grasshoppers; and some dragonfly imitations.
- · Tapered leaders of 7 1/2 feet with 6-pound tippet.
- · Fly Box and fanny pack to carry flies, nippers and leaders.

The nice thing about fly fishing is that it's relatively simple. It can also be a relaxing getaway from the craziness of daily life. So now, you have no excuses. Check fly fishing off your bucket list and I'll see you at the lake!

Fun With Photography

Showers To Flowers: Native Blooms in April

here is no better way to celebrate the spirit of Earth Day than to explore the wild character of San Benito and Santa Clara counties. In particular, April is a perfect month to check out the wonderful diversity of wildflowers in the region. The storms

of March have given way to a riot of colorful flower species. Many of these flowers are California natives that reach their peak in abundance in April, and they can be wonderful photographic subjects singly or as blankets of color across the landscape.

Early blooming species include shooting stars, goldfields, fiddle necks, Indian paintbrush and Indian warrior. Some of these wildflowers are still on display in April, especially along riparian corridors and in wet areas at higher elevations. These species are followed by fiest aflowers. baby blue eyes, monkey flowers, poppies, lupine and some wonderfully complex lilies. By the end of April, mariposa lilies, larkspur and clarkia are blooming, as well as bitterroot in rocky areas.

Native flowers can be found throughout the region. Driving on rural highways, especially along Highway 25 and down to Parkfield Grade, can yield blankets of wildflower color on the roadsides. Protected areas—Henry Coe State Park. Pinnacles National Park, the Panoche Valley and Hills and the wetlands of the South Bay-provide a wealth of different flower species to marvel at.


For photography, try to capture images of wildflowers from a variety of angles. Use a wide-angle lens to photograph flowers within the greater context of surrounding habitats. Use macro lenses to capture intimate details and complex structures in single flowers. Use narrow depth of field to really isolate focus on specific elements of flowers, or greater depth of field to bring whole landscapes into focus. Try photographing early in the day to take advantage of even lighting and still air. Use a tripod to stabilize cameras for long exposures ... and be patient if the wind is blowing flowers in and out of focus!

California native flowers are beautiful photographic subjects, and they are also essential for pollinators including birds, butterflies, bees and moths. Consider becoming a member with the California Native Plant Society and donating to their ongoing efforts to protect and preserve our local wildflowers and the habitats that support them. And enjoy the April blooms that decorate our wild areas!




