# Pick a Path, Any Path

ummer is all about grilling, good music and great friends and family—but it's also about reconnecting with our surroundings, and thankfully the South Valley has some of the best trails in the world. We scoured the region for some of the coolest hikes for families and solo adventurers, as well as a few trails to kick back and sip a little vino. Enjoy!

# Big Basin

It's hard to go wrong with a hike in Big Basin. About 20 miles outside of Santa Cruz in the wilderness that borders Highway 1, Big Basin boasts 80-plus miles of trail for every level of activity and interest: simple nature walks, full-day treks, and plenty of majestic scenery.

# Stanford Dish Walk

Recently renovated, "the Dish Loop" or "Dish Hike" has been a favorite free outdoor activity for decades—a paved road that runs past the old satellite dish that looms over cattle fields and Interstate 280. There are a few inclines that can be a bit of a challenge, but you'll be rewarded with sweeping views of the South Bay.

### **Mission Peak**

Get those selfie sticks ready. Mission Peak is perhaps the region's most popular hike, but that doesn't mean it's a cake walk. Made up of six miles of varied terrain +10

**\*8** and a punishing incline, Mission Peak trail leads up to the hills overlooking Fremont and greater Silicon Valley. The decorative tower at the summit is a popular place for a celebratory "we did it!" Instagram post. Bring plenty of water.

# Henry Coe State Park

Straddling Santa Clara and Stanislaus counties, Henry W. Coe is Disneyland for nature lovers. More than 250 miles of trails and roads ready for hiking, campgrounds, fishing, horseback riding, and some good old-fashioned swimmin' holes make up the attractions to be found here.

## Uvas Canyon

The stars of the show at Uvas Canyon county park are its many waterfalls, but that's not all it has to offer. Uvas Canyon has picnic areas, campgrounds (with flush toilets!), and is dog-friendly, so long as Rover's leashed. The waterfalls can all be visited on the popular Waterfall Loop, but for something a little different, pick the Contour Trail or the cardio-heavy Knibb's Knob or Knobcone.

# The Pinnacles

With a backstory worthy of Game of Thrones, The Pinnacles National Park was created by volcanic eruptions that occurred 23 million years ago. What remains is one of the most unique preserves in all the world with large chaparral and oak woodlands flanked by giant canyons and featuring wildlife galore. Before choosing from 13 trails branching out from the campgrounds, check out the "cyberkhike" on the park's website: www.nps.gov/pinn.

# Sierra Vista

Just a short drive from downtown San Jose, the new Sierra Vista trails offer 11 miles of passageways free to roam from 8am to sunset. As part of the Santa Clara Valley Open Space Preserve, the 1.2-mile Aquila Loop is an especially family friendly hike looking out over Alum Rock. The space features majestic oak woodlands, rolling grasslands and chaparral communities.

# Sips in the Sun

#### Santa Clara Valley Wine Trail VARIOUS LOCATIONS

We may not be known as a wine destination, but our climate's excellent for enterprising vintners. The Santa Clara Valley Wine Trail provides a welcome alternative to the two-hour trek to Napa. Stop in for a tasting at Solis, J. Lohr, Fortino and Guglielemo wineries, Kirigin Cellars, or even Casa de Fruta—yes, they have a winery. In total, there are 27 wineries to choose from. Personalized day trips can be arranged by going to santaclarawines. com or calling 408.659.0050.

# Concannon

Run by the same family since 1883, Concannon is America's oldest ongoing single-family owned winery. Founded by an Irish immigrant, the Bordeauxinspired vineyard is known for its Cabernet, and offers tours, tastings and seasonal food pairings. Tours run \$20 to \$70 per person, depending on length and type. With a beautiful location and staggering history, this is a true Northern California experience.

#### Testarossa Los gatos

Though founded by two ex techies, Los Gatos' Testarossa Winery is a bastion of old-world wine technique. The result is a number of highly rated Pinot Noirs and Chardonnays, made in small batches. Every vintage released in 2012 was scored 90 or higher (out of 100) on the wine point system. Testarossa is based out of the historic Novitiate Winery in downtown Los Gatos, a stunning stone and wood seminary built by Jesuits in the 1880s. Tastings start at a reasonable \$10, which makes the winery a great place for the uninitiated.

#### Thomas Fogarty skyline boulevard, woodside

Tomas Fogarty was a revolutionary cardiovascular surgeon before retiring and becoming one of the top 100 winemakers in the world, according to *Wine & Spirits Magazine.* As if saving countless lives weren't enough, the man has created an astounding grape empire in Woodside, high up on the northern edge of the Santa Cruz Mountains. soak it up

# 'Early Days' and Old School Rides

he aroma of sweet glazed dough, Bavarian crème and chocolate will greet visitors to San Juan Bautista this month, as the San Juan Bakery celebrates "National Doughnut Day" on Sunday, June 5. Located at 319 Third St., the bakery will serve up special deals until the last krugle is served or it's 5 pm—whichever comes first!

Father's Day weekend is always special in San Juan Bautista, and this year is no exception. On June 18 and 19, the San Juan Bautista State Historic Park hosts its annual two-day "Early Days" event from 11am to 4 pm. All the old buildings in the state park come alive, with costumed storytelling and on-site demonstrations. Guests will see blacksmithing techniques at the forge and learn things like tortilla making, corn husk doll fabrication and musket identification. # **Health & Beauty** 5 Sunscreen Tips to Stay Safe this Summer

ummertime means fun in the sun, but that can also include sunburns, dry and peeling skin and a chance for premature aging. Have no fear! Here are five ways to prevent damage while enjoying those pool parties and BBQs.

1. Not all sunscreens are created equal. Make sure you buy products labeled "broad spectrum." This lets you know that the sunscreen blocks out both UVA and UVB sun rays. UVB rays are the shorter rays responsible for burning skin. UVA rays are the longer rays that actually penetrate the dermis and cause damage to the DNA. Sometimes estheticians refer to UVA as the "aging" rays, as they are responsible for causing wrinkles, hyper pigmentation or "sun spots." The FDA does additional testing to ensure the formulas protect against both UV rays, so you can trust that those labels are legit.

2. No sunscreen is completely waterproof or sweat proof. And while most will say "water-resistant" on the label, a good rule of thumb is to reapply every 60-90 minutes into heavy exercise or pool time. No matter what you're doing, it's best to reapply after two hours of sun exposure.

3. Remember that no sunscreen blocks all

UV light. Reapplying is a must but SPF numbers can be tricky. In theory, SPF numbers are the amount of time you can stay in the sun without getting sunburned.

For example, if you would normally burn after 10 minutes, a sunscreen with SPF 15 should allow you to stay out for 150 minutes before burning—but that may not always be the case. The intensity of the UV rays, time of day and amount of sunscreen applied all play a role.

Look for a sun protection factor (SPF) of 30 or higher. The 30 blocks out about 97 percent of UV rays, while SPF 15 blocks out only 93 percent. SPF 50 is usually the best way to go for long sun exposure days, as it blocks out about 98 percent of UV rays. Those are pretty great numbers but you'll still receive a little bit of exposure. The fairer your skin, the greater chance for damage. When in doubt, throw on that hat, cover up or just get in the shade after a few hours in the sun.

4. Do your research. Make sure to avoid chemical ingredients such as oxybenzone and retinyl palmitate, which can be skin irritants and cause allergic reactions. Active ingredients like zinc oxide and titanium dioxide, which are physical sunblocks, can actually be good for your skin.

Zinc is also known to help heal acne breakouts and it's found in a lot of mineral makeup.

5. Give your skin its vitamins. The skin relies on antioxidants for protection against UV rays, which can cause free radicals and photoaging of the skin. Free radicals damage DNA, proteins and lipids, which cause skin cells to die. Since the skin receives the most intense free-radical damage from UV light exposure, replenishing and increasing the antioxidant defense of the skin becomes crucial for protection and repair.

Topical vitamin C has also been shown to improve skin texture and tone, reduce brown spots, decrease the appearance of fine lines and wrinkles, and help prevent their formation.

# **Pet Life** Keep Kids Safe around Dogs

here has been a surge in the number of articles and photos on the internet regarding dog bites and children. I don't know of an actual increase nationwide, but I do think that awareness is increasing with social media. Parents are becoming more aware of the damage that even a very small dog can do to a child's face. People are also realizing that in many cases the dog in question is a family dog and warning signs have been ignored. Here are some tips to help keep a child safe from dog bites.

 $\cdot$  Stay away from dogs you do not know.

You do not know their temperament nor their rabies vaccination status. The sweetest dog can turn aggressive when approached, especially if they are not used to children. Some dogs are also very protective of their owner and can become aggressive when approached.

• Teach children not to tease dogs. Pulling the ears, tail and hair may look cute and funny, but even the best of dogs can run out of patience. Teach kids how to respect the family dog.

• Always supervise small children around dogs. Even though your children may know

how to behave around a dog, parents should be aware that children sometimes "forget" what they have been taught. Or they just plain just ignore instructions.

• Give the dog its space when sleeping and eating. Although you want to have a dog that is trained to not be food aggressive, constantly having a toddler disturbing dinner can also create some behavioral issues.

• Teach your children how to properly play with the dog and make sure that the time is enjoyable and safe for everyone. This is a good opportunity to teach both the child and the dog how to interact.

• Teach your child to approach a dog quietly without running, yelling, hitting and making sudden movements. A startled dog may bite whatever comes its way.

• Don't let your child hug your dog. Very few dogs like to be hugged. Most find it uncomfortable and stressful.

As a parent, be aware of warning signs that your dog is unhappy with your child or their behavior. Growling, running away, pinning back the ears and holding the tail between the legs are warning signs that should not be ignored. Most family pets that have bitten someone show one or more of these signs. Pets that have shown aggression in the past have that potential, but do not assume they will be safe just because a tragedy has not yet happened. Both children and dogs can be unpredictable and that can set the stage for a dangerous situation.

Any parent would feel horrible to know that their child was bitten, or worse permanently disfigured by a family dog. Remember that even if the last bite was minor and did not break the skin, that does not mean that the next time your child will be so lucky. Be proactive and protect your child.

# A Passion for Plants

# The Art and Science of Watering

ummer is almost here, and with it comes our big watering season. As a nursery owner, one question I hear all the time is: "how much water does it need?"

That's more complicated than it sounds. There are many variables to consider. When you ask a nursery why a certain plant died, you're often told that it either didn't get enough water or it was watered too much. Determining how much water a plant needs is a moving target. The science that looks at this uses *evapotranspiration*, or ET, as a tool to help figure things out. It's a really long—and fascinating—word. Water *evaporates* from the soil at a certain rate, depending on things such as air temperature, wind speed and sunlight. The same factors affect the amount of water that plants *transpire*. When you combine the two and apply some mathematical calculations, you get the ET rate, which can be used by irrigation controllers to more closely apply the right amount of water to a landscape or field crop. All of this is the science of watering. But there is an art to watering. While it's something you generally have to learn on your own, I'd like to share some tips I've learned along the way.

When you initially put a plant in a container or into the ground, it's important to water it right away. This settles the soil around the roots so there are no large air pockets. But roots (except for bog plants) do need some air and that's why potting soil needs to have good drainage. It's important to choose the right sized container, too. Don't forget that containers must have drainage holes. I usually recommend moving plants up one size at a time, rather than moving them into something drastically larger. It's very easy to overwater when your plant rootball is overwhelmed in a huge container.

Don't panic if you're now realizing you forgot to water that new plant. If it's wilted and you're afraid you've killed it, just water it thoroughly. If it's so dry the soil has shrunk away from the container sides, you might need to soak it for an hour or so to re-wet the soil. But then drain it well, and only water it again when the soil starts to dry a bit. The roots have been damaged, and constant watering will only make them rot. Sometimes, if a plant has suffered more than a little damage, it helps to remove the pot, shake off some dirt, prune the branches a bit and re-pot into a smaller container.

A technique to help plants survive a vacation is to gradually taper off watering until you reach the bare minimum. This won't work with all plants, but it will cause them to slow their growth. That way, if your vacation waterer isn't reliable, the plants will survive longer on the short rations.

Whatever else you do this month, be sure to get out there and plant something!

# **Farmer in the Field** Summer's Sweet, Sweet Corn

une just screams summer. Most kids are out of school, vacations have been planned and the thought of all the fresh, seasonal fruits and vegetables is intoxicating. When it comes to summer barbeques, it just wouldn't be the same without sweet mouthwatering corn on the cob. It's an American staple like tomatoes, watermelon and apple pie.

The first sweet corn was grown by Native Americans and was a spontaneous mutation of field corn. This is recessive mutation that results naturally in the genes, converting sugar to starch inside the endosperm of the corn kernel. In 1779, the Iroquois gave the sweet corn, known as "Papoon," to the European settlers and it soon became a favorite food in the southern and central regions of the United States. Spanish explorers then introduced sweet corn to the rest of the world.

When buying sweet corn, stay away from the grocery store and buy from the farmer if possible. The best tasting corn should not be any older than a day. Husks should be vibrant green and never dry. I like to use the thumbnail test. Pull the husk back slightly and add pressure to a kernel. If the juices spray out it's a good sign.

Did you know an ear of corn is only about 69 calories? That's the same as an apple with less than one-fourth the sugar. Cooked corn is even healthier, increasing the antioxidant activity that helps protect the body from cancer and heart disease. What's not healthy is butter, the topping that has become so popular. I used to use butter but gave that up when I married the farmer who grows the corn. There is nothing better than picking corn on the way home and eating it for dinner that night, sans anything.

# Corn and Scallion Chilaquiles

Recipe courtesy of MarthaStewart.com PREP: 25 MINS TOTAL TIME: 25 MINS SERVINGS: 6

#### INGREDIENTS

- · 1 tablespoon bacon fat or unsalted butter
- 6 scallions, white and pale-green parts only, finely chopped (about 1/4 cup)
- 1 tablespoon minced jalapeno chile (from 1/2 jalapeno)
- 2 1/2 cups fresh or leftover grilled corn kernels (from 3 to 4 ears)
- · 1 teaspoon coarse salt
- 12 large eggs 3 cups broken tortilla chips, plus whole chips for serving
- 2 1/2 ounces cotija or any cheese, crumbled into large pieces or grated (about 1/2 cup; optional)
- · Cilantro sprigs, for garnish
- · Avocado slices, for serving
- · Cherry tomatoes, for serving

#### DIRECTIONS

1. Preheat broiler with rack in top third of oven. Melt bacon fat in a large skillet over medium high heat. Add scallions and chile and cook, stirring, 1 minute. Add corn and salt and cook, stirring, 1 minute.

2. Whisk together eggs in a large bowl and stir in chips. Add to skillet with corn and cook, stirring, until bottom starts to set but is still wet, about 1 minute. Stir and transfer to a broiler-proof 8-by-11 1/2-inch baking dish; broil until eggs are set, about 2 minutes. Scatter cheese on top and let stand 10 minutes. Garnish with cilantro sprigs and serve with chips (tuck some into the top), avocado, and tomatoes.

# **Fun With Photography** Hunters On The Fly: Photographing Lizards

here are a lot of beautiful birds in San Benito and Santa Clara counties, but flycatchers are a particular delight for photographers and wildlife enthusiasts during the hot summer months. Flycatchers are a group of songbirds that eat different insects, often by chasing and catching them in flight. They have high metabolisms and require a lot of insects to keep up their energy levels and feed nestlings during the summer breeding months. As a result, flycatchers remain active throughout the day, even during the

midday hours when most other birds slow down and become less vocal.

Smaller flycatcher species in the region include phoebes, wood-pewees and flycatchers in the *Empidonax* genus, including pacific slope flycatchers. Larger flycatchers include western kingbirds and ash-throated flycatchers. Certain species like Say's phoebes are residents throughout the year, but most species are migrants that arrive in the spring to set up territories for nesting and raising young.

Flycatchers are very important as a

natural pest control for numerous insect populations. Because they require a lot of insects to keep them going, flycatchers keep pests like mosquitoes, ants, biting flies and beetles in check, along with butterflies, moths and other insects. Some of the larger flycatcher species even eat lizards and frogs.

Most flycatcher species have interesting color patterns and active behaviors that make them very photogenic subjects. Black phoebes are a common sight in San Benito and Santa Clara counties, building nests on houses and bridges. They are small and perky birds with blackish backs and heads contrasting with white bellies. Ash-throated flycatchers are a larger species that sing with a toy whistle call. They have red-brown backs, cinnamon wing bars and lemon bellies. Black phoebes and ash-throated flycatchers both have small head crests that they raise when alarmed or aggravated, and they hunt for insects from territorial perches on tree branches, slowly scanning areas, then hunting from the wing to grab prey in flight or on the ground.

Flycatchers are fairly approachable birds that are easy to watch and photograph with a bit of practice. Follow their whistling calls and watch for these feisty birds perched on territorial branches they return to again and again after hunting. Using moderate to long telephoto lenses, you can focus on and anticipate perches that flycatchers use repeatedly, resulting in some very nice compositions and captures of flycatcher activity. Many flycatchers will nest on or near human structures, so keep an eve out for them in the summer and think about where you can position yourself to capture images without being too disruptive.

Flycatchers are fascinating little hunters to watch and photograph, so take some time to enjoy them while they are active during the coming summer months!
